BRAND NAMES: Tylenol, FeverAll (suppositories), generic acetaminophen

**INDICATIONS:** For treatment of fever and pain.

FREQUENCY: Repeat every 4 to 6 hours as needed. Don't give more than 5 times a day.

**DOSAGE:** Determine by using the table below. If using liquid suspension, please confirm that the concentration of the product you are using is 160mg per every 5mL.

## **Table Notes:**

- AGE LIMIT: Don't use under 12 weeks of age, as very young infants with fevers need to be evaluated by a medical provider right away. EXCEPTION: Fever from immunization if child is 8 weeks of age or older.
- MEASURING the DOSAGE: Syringes and droppers are more accurate than teaspoons. If possible, use the syringe or dropper that comes with the medicine. If not, medicine syringes are available at pharmacies.
- SUPPOSITORIES: Acetaminophen also comes in 80, 120, 325 and 650 mg suppositories (the rectal dose in mg is the same as the dosage in mg given by mouth).

Why treat a fever? The main reason to treat a fever is to make the person feel better. Even higher temperatures (103°F or greater) are not in themselves dangerous or significant unless your child has a history of seizures or a chronic disease. The fever itself is not the disease, only a sign that the body's defenses are trying to fight an infection. Treating a fever helps a child feel better but does not help cure the illness that is causing the fever.

It is not necessary to lower a child's fever to normal. Simply lowering the temperature by 1-2 degrees will make your child feel much better and may even help them sleep better.

May I use Ibuprofen and Acetaminophen together? Ibuprofen may NOT be given to children under 6 months old. If your child is over 6 months old, then yes, you can give a dose of Acetaminophen and follow it 3 hours later with a dose of Ibuprofen. If your child is very uncomfortable, you can continue to alternate medicines every 3 hours. Be sure to use the correct doses of each medication based on your child's weight. Do not give Ibuprofen more often than every 6 hours and do not give Acetaminophen more often than ever 4 hours.

**How long to treat a fever?** Most fevers resolve as the child improves. If the fever persists for more than a few days, or you are concerned about your child, please call the office for advice or seek emergency care.
